"I guess we will have to put them back," he bravely said. "We will come back some other time, maybe tomorrow." With that statement, a soft sob broke from the little girl. "But Jesus would have loved these shoes," she cried. "Well, we'll go home and work some more. Don't cry. We'll come back," the boy said.

Noting the children's conversation, she quickly handed \$3.00 to the cashier. These children had waited in line for a long time. And, after all, it was Christmas. Suddenly a pair of arms



came around her and a small voice said, "Thank you lady."

Provincial Chapters mark another milestone for MSMHC

Provinces of Bangalore, Kolkata, Tinsukia, Shillong, Tezpur and the Italian Delegation crossed another milestone with the Chapters held during the months of October and November 2014. The Chapters with the theme- "Spirit and Spirituality of the MSMHC", were preceded by six days of spiritual retreat preached by Fr. Roy Anthony SDB of Silchar Province. The retreat itself was an invitation to the Capitulars to delve deep into their rich legacy of Spirit and Spirituality, handed down by their Father and Founder, Bishop Stephen Ferrando. Being reminded of the words of Pope Francis to the Korean Bishops during his visit to Korea this August, Fr. Roy

urged the Sisters to be "the guardians of memory and hope", and explained to them the importance of treasuring the history, and re-visiting the heroism, commitment and generosity of the pioneers. Guiding them to ponder on Jesus' life and mission, and Mary's submission to God's will, he reminded them of their own call to holiness, nurturing communities.

All the Provinces had the privilege of being supported and guided by the Superior General, Sr. Philomena Mathew, who made sure to be present in all the Chapters, accompanied by the members from her Council. In an effort to enlighten the assembly on the theme she dealt extensively on its meaning and its various dimensions. She pointed out that abiding by the Spirit and Spirituality is a concrete way of living the vocation as MSMHC after the example of St. John Bosco, St. Mary Dominica Mazarello, other salesian saints, and Founder Bishop Stephen Ferrando.

The Provincial Chapter was an invitation to enter into a deeper understanding of the Spirit and Spirituality of the Congregation, treasuring its rich legacy. It had its emphasis to become the guardians of memories, and carrying forward the flame of hope.

Province of Little Flower Bangalore

The significant days of the 4th Provincial Chapter in the annals of Little Flower Province, Bangalore were held on 3-5 October. Prior to the inaugural function on 3rd morning, the Capitulars, along with the Superior General, Sr. Philomena Mathew and General Councillor for Social Apostolate, Sr. Rose Paite, gathered in the Chapel for the Divine touch, after which was the procession to the chapter hall which was led by Superior General carrying the lighted candle and the Provincial Superior carrying the Holy Bible. Fr. K.O Thomas, SDB, Vice Provincial of Bangalore, specified that Chapter is a moment to review, renew and relaunch. He spoke about the principles and adaptations for renewal of religious life, given in *Vita Consacrata* and

Province of Sacred Heart of Jesus, Tinsukia



Reaching out to grassroots through WAC

Women Apostles for Catechesis (WAC) movement shares the mission of missionary evangelization and Catechesis of the Congregation. Hence, WAC is initiated at the local levels, encouraging the participation of women in the villages.

Inauguration of WAC (local level) was held on 9th December at Satgoan in Diphu Diocese under the initiative of Sr. Christine Mynsong, General Councillor for Evangelization and Sr. Helen Barla, Provincial Councillor for Evangelization, Tezpur Province. The formal inauguration of the movement was followed by two-day animation for the newly formed members of the WAC. Clarifying the purpose, aims and objectives of the movement, Sr. Christine Mynsong explained the responsible role of the members of WAC in collaborating with the Congregation. They also had input



sessions on the role of the mothers in the family, importance of family catechesis and faith formation. They were taught of the importance of sacraments, family prayers and the need to study and reflect the Word of God to carry out their mission. They also dealt with some of the challenges of today and discussed some of the problems encountered in the family and society.

Another inauguration of WAC at the local level was held at Goreswar, a Parish Centre of the Archdiocese of Guwahati on 10th December. The programme began with the Holy Eucharist, presided over by the Archbishop John Moolachira of

Guwahati. The inaugural ceremony after the Holy Mass was officiated by the Archbishop. There was hoisting the flag, scripture reading, lighting of the lamp, special prayers and messages delivered by the dignitaries. The members were guided to attend two days programme which had input sessions on various topics related to the movement. The programme had its focus on the role of mothers in families and discussed on family issues and problems. They were given understanding on the importance of sacraments, family prayers and Word of God which would sustain them while they undertake the task of catechesis and faith formation in their locality.

Sr. Jane Francis, General Councillor for Education had the animation programme at St. Mary's Hr. Sec. School, Padampukhuri, Nagaland on





13-16 August, 2014. The opening of the Silver Jubilee of the School was also held on the occasion of her visit. During her four-day programme, she held meeting with the Sisters to discuss and draw up plans for improving the mission, conducted re-orientation programme for teachers and animated the students of classes VII, VIII, IX and X.

Besides the animation programmes and

meetings, she also spent time for inspecting the School to verify the records. She assessed the education mission of different sectors and offered suggestions for improvement and effectiveness. Her conference to the members of the community focused on the spirit and charism of the congregation and highlighted the importance of assisting and accompanying the students.

Sr. Lucinda Salboro (Hawaii), the first vocation from the overseas, professed on 8 December, 2014 shares her vocation story.

God's ways are perfect and He makes everything beautiful in His own time. I left my good job and what the secular world calls securities - savings and checking accounts, retirement money, medical coverage, etc. I left my family, my mother who is now 84 years old and my younger

sister with whom I lived all through the past years of my life.

A flame was ignited within, when a Buddhist friend of mine during the high school days introduced to me about Mother Theresa. I happened to hear about her good works in India. I was stirred from within and disturbed when she talked about Mother Theresa, who saw Jesus in the needy, abandoned and marginalized. From that moment, I was in search to find out the person Jesus, about whom Mother Theresa talked often. Eventually, I believed that I too am called to work for Jesus, on a full time basis as a religious sister, and I waited for God's own time.

The MSMHC launched its mission in Hawaii in the year 2008. It was where I was born and raised.
