FROM THE SUPERIOR GENERAL

Leaving Comfort Zones to Reach Out

Pope Francis has declared year 2015 as the year of Consecrated Life. Through this he calls the Church's religious priests, brothers and sisters, to "wake up the world" with their testimony of faith, holiness and hope. It is important to know the underlying meaning of this call by understanding one's vocation and mission. It is a call to revamp one's personal life and the world around. Emphasizing on living a life that has witness value he said, "Religious life ought to promote growth in the Church by way of attraction. The Church must be attractive. Wake up the world! Be witnesses of a different way of doing things, of acting! It is possible to live differently in this world." Living a life of witness demands one to live an authentic life, which corresponds to one's words and conduct. It is a call to go beyond, in order to reach out to the world in need.

One important aspect of reaching out is to leave one's own comfort zones. In his message for Lent this year, Pope Francis wrote: "Usually, when we are healthy and comfortable, we forget about others: we are unconcerned with their problems, their sufferings and the injustices they endure... Our heart grows cold. As long as I am relatively healthy and comfortable, I don't think about those less well off. Today, this selfish attitude of indifference has taken on global proportions, to the extent that we can speak of globalization of indifference."

Today, the world is growing into the extremes: rich and the poor. The 'rich' who is materially wealthy are poor in the heart. They form a minority group, taking for themselves the major portion of the world's wealth. Even though they enjoy worldly comfort, they are deprived of spiritual wealth such as peace, joy, serenity and contentment. There is a great need to reach out to them with mercy and love. The 'poor' who is out of the reach to any resources for their wellbeing keeps growing in numbers. There aren't many who reach out to them or stand by them. As the world is seen growing richer, they are pushed to the margins. Explaining the need to reach out, Pope Francis said, "We need to come out of ourselves and head for the periphery. We need to avoid the spiritual sickness of a Church that is wrapped up in its own world: when a Church



becomes like this, it grows sick. It is true that going out onto the street implies the risk of accidents happening, as they would to any ordinary man or woman. But if the Church stays wrapped up in itself, it will age. And if I had to choose between a wounded Church that goes out onto the streets and a sick withdrawn Church, I would definitely choose the first one..." It is essential that we leave our comfort zones to reach out to the needy of today.

Pope Francis' call to all the consecrated persons is to live the reality of the poverty amidst them and to reach out to all with compassion and understanding. Therefore, let us make every effort to go out in action through prayer, advocacy and generosity.

The YAC members were lucky to have reflections on peace building by the Archbishop Emeritus of G u w a h a t i , T h o m a s Menamparampil, who is known for his continued commitment to have peace, reconciliation and stability in Northeast India, an area full of territorial and ethnic conflicts. Addressing the

gathering, he spoke about the nitty-gritties of peace building. He emphasized on the aspect of being at peace with oneself before working for peace building. He also gave tips on how one can build peace and deal with one's own anger and other negative emotions by channelizing them positively and by having control over the situation.

Being aware of the importance of instilling knowledge on 'discernment', which is crucial for today's young people, Sr. Christine Mynsong, General Councillor for Evangelization, focused on giving some tips on discerning one's vocation. She also discussed with the group on adolescent issues and gave guidelines to deal with those, and explained the ways to enhance

relationship skills.

Sessions after lunch and dinner were comprised of different activities by the participants: Bible skits, SCC Prayer and Gospel Sing Out. There was presentation of different cultural programmes that intended to help the participants learn more about other cultures. Another special occasion that impressed everyone was the exhibition on the missionary involvement and activities of the YAC in various units, presented by the delegates of the five Provinces.

The convention was concluded on the third day evening with prize distribution and vote of thanks. Prizes were given to the winners of different activities: quiz, exhibition, skits and dances.

January. They distributed clothes and spent time with the affected people, listening to their sad plight. The Centre for

Development Initiatives (CDI), under the leadership of Sr. Rose Hauniang, General Councillor for Social Apostolate also undertook a number of visits to render timely assistance to those in need.

He said that through this apostolic exhortation, Pope Francis is calling upon the Church and the world with encouragement to begin a new chapter in evangelization. It also addressed the consecrated persons to 'Wake up' and to be 'Mystics'. Commenting on it Fr. Emmanuel said that a mystic is a person who lives with God, moves by the Spirit, remains dynamic and makes positive changes in the world.

It calls for a renewal and re-commitment to the founding Charism. 

Refresher Programme for Formators

A five-day animation programme was held for formators, organized by Sr. Nancy Augustine, General Councillor for formation, at Hatigaon on 2-6 March 2015. Fr. Emmanuel Uppamthadathil MSFS, Fr. Xavier Paul and Fr. Thomas Lakra were the resource persons. They also had input sessions by Sr. Philomena Mathew, the Superior General and Sr. Nancy Augustine.

Fr. Emmanuel dealt with the topic, 'Religious life in the third millennium'. He stressed on the importance of following the original spirituality of Jesus which gives thrust on three aspects: 1) Knowledge / Experience of God, 2) Freedom and 3) Love. In this regard he said, "We are consecrated to Jesus Christ, and so we have to visualize Jesus' spirituality which is based on experience of God, freedom, and love." He also emphasized the



need to become mystics who remains rooted in God and dynamic, creating positive energy.

Sr. Philomena Mathew, the Superior General spoke on 'MSMHC formation'. Putting forward some of the major challenges faced today, she reminded the Sisters of their duties to educate and accompany the formees by providing moral, spiritual and intellectual formation.

Fr. Xavier Paul spoke on the importance making personal efforts to become persons of God. He told them that, Formators should always pray to Jesus, trust

on His love and blessings. He further said, "We need to pray always telling Jesus to fill us with his divine love and always acknowledge that we are created by God to praise, revere and serve Him, and by this means save souls of our own and that of others."

Fr. Thomas Lakra SDB, Vice Provincial of Guwahati, focused his talk on five key points which are essential for all the stages of formation: 1) formation to affective maturity, 2) motivation to religious life, 3) personal profile, 4) positive emotional maturity and, 5) psychosexual integration.
