FROM THE SUPERIOR GENERAL

Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful (Lk 6:36)

As the year of consecrated life has come to an end, we are invited to enter into another year of grace with the opening of the extraordinary year of mercy. It is a journey that calls for a spiritual experience of receiving and extending mercy. Pope Francis calls us to live this year in the light of the Lord's words: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful" (Lk 6:36).

God's love and goodness permeates the world. He gives us all things, natural and spiritual, temporal and eternal. It is not that we ought to receive all such things, but God out of pure goodness, gratuitously gives us all we need. We could have been led to eternal damnation, but His great mercy frees us from all evils, making us His own. Today, we are certain of the life that is eternal through Jesus His beloved Son. The Father's love is made visible in the face of His beloved Son. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3: 16).

Indeed, this holy year invites us to choose the path that Jesus lived. It requires a change of life by accepting Jesus into our lives. According to Saint Paul anyone who receives Jesus becomes a new creation. "...if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the

new has come" (2 Cor 5: 17). In this new life, one is set to experience a changed state of life in which there is fullness. It is all about living in Christ Jesus and not merely knowing and loving him. In it there is newness, and that there springs new aspirations and desires, resulting in new delights and new joys. It calls for a life centred on Christ which leads to wholeness and perfect order.

Living a Christ centred life impels us to be merciful like Him. The entire life of Jesus was a manifestation of God's loving mercy. The Gospels speak about his unconditional love and mercy. He was moved with compassion and went about doing good to all the people. Gospel of Mark tells us, "When he saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things" (Mk 6:34). Jesus had compassion whenever He encountered the suffering humanity. Therefore, He went about doing good, healing the sick, feeding the hungry, forgiving sins and freeing the oppressed.

This holy year invites us to be like the Father and to continue the mission of Jesus with greater zeal and commitment. It is an opportune time for us to show the visible face of Jesus to the humanity. Today, the



world stands in need of liberation much more than anything else. It is important that we become aware of the existing reality around and do all that we can within our power. Whenever we reach out to alleviate the sufferings of others, especially those considered least in our society we become the channels of God's mercy and our genuine actions become salvific. Gospel of Mathew stresses on the importance of reaching out to the least in the society. "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." (Mt 25: 40).

May this holy year of mercy lead us to understand the great mercy which God has for us and may it urge us to become Christ like in all our endevours.

Twenty-nine Sisters made Final Commitment



Twenty-nine Sisters made Final Profession on the occasion of the feast of the Immaculate Conception on 8 December at MSMHC Generalate, Hatigaon.

The Holy Eucharistic celebration began at 10.00 am, officiated by His Grace, Most Rev. Dominic Lumon, Archbishop of Imphal. In his homily, Bishop Lumon spoke about the meaning of consecrated life and congratulated the Sisters for their courageous response to God's call. He said, "God has destined us to be sons and daughters in Jesus Christ." Underlining the meaning of three vows he reiterated the words of Pope Francis and said, "The religious with their three

vows can wake up the world."

Prior to the event, the Sisters had a two-month long intensive programme of prayer and special classes at Bethel, Barapani under the guidance of Sr. Nancy Augustine, General Councillor for Formation.

The group arrived at Hatigaon on 6 December and continued their prayer and reflection until the awaited morning, 8 December.

On the same day in Shillong, 34 Novices made their first profession. Congratulations to the Sisters who bring in freshness, vitality and holiness to the Church and the Congregation.

Festive Oratory

The community of Hatigaon had the 'Festive Oratory Day' on 11 October at its School campus. About 600 children from various centres which were given assistance by the Junior Sisters during their Sunday apostolate came for the programme. The day's function was organised by the Junior Sisters under the guidance of Sr. Christine Mynsong, General Councillor for Evangelization.

The opening ceremony began with the lighting of the lamp by the Superior General, Sr. Philomena Mathew, the Chief Guest of the day, along with the representatives of each centre. She addressed the children and spoke to them about Bishop Ferrando who loved children and showed much interest in their welfare.

Various games and competitions were held after the inaugural function. The winners of the competitions were awarded during the concluding function. The day came to a close with a sumptuous meal shared by all present.









Inter-Provincial Council Meet

The annual meeting of the Interprovincial council (IPC) 2015 was held at Bethel, Barapani with the theme, 'Renewal in Religious Life, Spirit and Charism' from 4 October to 10 October. The five days animation programme began with a day's prayer and reflection, during which Fr. Thomas Manjaly from Oriens Theological College, Shillong, spoke on "Reclaiming a space for the MSMHC", and challenged the participants to remain rooted in their charism and become relevant in today's world.

Superior General, Sr. Philomena Mathew presented a paper on "Renewal in religious life, spirit, and charism". She presented the present state of the congregation and its major concerns. There were also presentations from the General Councillors and Provincials of all the Provinces so

that the participants are made aware of the present situation and the challenges the MSMHC face today.

Besides the joint meetings which dealt with common concerns of the Congregation, the general team had exclusive meetings with the provincial teams to chalk out concrete ways to live the charism and spirit of the Congregation more meaningfully.

They also had an input session on 'mission' by Fr. TC George SDB of Bangalore Province. It helped the group to focus on MSMHC Mission and its set priorities. He helped the participants to probe into the present situation of the Missionary Animation Centre (MAC) and how to make use of it effectively to further the mission.

On the final day, the group assembled at St. Margaret's Convent, Peachlands for the Holy Eucharist and to offer special prayers at the tomb of Bishop Stephen Ferrando, the Founder of the Congregation. They also visited Mary Immaculate Novitiate at Mawroh, Mawlai.

The liturgical celebration was animated by the faithful of the Ponta Do Ouro community with the help of Bro. Poomagan.

The blessing of the Convent which is about three kilometres away from Ponta Do Ouro was witnessed by faithful and special invited guests. The ceremony was officiated by the Archbishop Francisco Chimoyo with a special prayer and cutting of the ribbon at the entrance, while the people intoned a hymn invoking the Holy Spirit. Sr.

Mary Clara and Sr. Saroj, the pioneers, accompanied the Archbishop for the blessing of the house and its premises.

The ceremony came to a close with a fellowship meal prepared by the people themselves.

New Presence in Köln Diocese Germany

Having received an invitation from the Diocese of Köln to work in an old age home, the MSMHC set off on 13 December, 2015 to begin the mission there. Sr. Lucy Augustine, Sr. Anita Albert and Sr. Susheela Basumatary are the pioneers of this new venture. Sr. Marta D' Rosario, the Delegation Superior was there to initiate the process.

At present, the Sisters are engaged in a language course and making the necessary preparations to undertake the work in an old age home.



They are staying in an apartment in St. Anna, belonging to Cellitinnen, where about 200 old people are looked after. There are also Augustinian sisters through whose initiative the MSMHC sisters were able to launch into this mission. They are helpful and provide them timely assistance. They stay in a nearby apartment and render services at St. Anna.

Jubilation at MSMHC Italian Delegation

Celebration of MSMHC Italian Delegation Day cum Silver Jubilee of Sr. Regina Gongmei was held at Turin on 15 October 2015. To mark the day, there was a solemn Eucharistic celebration at the chapel of St. Francis De Sale at the campus of Basilica of Mary Help Christians, Valdocco, presided over by Fr. Jerome SJ, from Vatican Radio for Tamil Language along with Fr. Nalayan SDB, from the Community of Valdocco for English-speaking group. Sisters representing the various communities in Italy, including students, participated in the celebration.

Fr. Jerome, in his homily empha-



sized the importance of 'the sense of belonging'. He said, "We are in the Sanctuary of Mary Help Christians, the source of strength for Salesians and Salesian Family". He further said, "people come to this Sanctuary not only just to spend vacation but they revere Don Bosco, Domenic Savio and Mary Mazzerello who lived and worked here." He also made a brief reflection on the life of two women. Mary and Elizabeth and pointed out how the impossible for men is made possible with God. He spoke about the power of God's intervention and the importance of remaining submissive to Him.

The Basilica of Mary Help Christians, Valdocco, where the celebration held is significant as it is a common heritage of the great Salesian Family. The chapel of St. Frances de Sales stands between the Magnificent Basilica of Mary Help of Christians and the Chapel of the Pinardi Shade. The chapel of St. Francis de Sales is the second chapel built for the oratory children of Valdocco. Its foundation stone was laid on 20 July 1851 and consecrated on 20 June 1852. For 16 years (until 1868), it remained as the heart of the newly born Salesian Congregation.



The Jubilee Year of Mercy: A Year of Grace


Pope Francis opened the Holy Door at St. Peters Basilica on Tuesday, 8 December, 2015, marking the beginning of the Jubilee of Mercy, a special Holy Year for Catholics. The ceremony took place after he celebrated Mass for the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception in St. Peter's Square. In spite of the rain that day, over 50 thousand arrived, including the President and Prime Minister of Italy, Sergio Mattarella and Matteo Renzi as well as King Albert II of Belgium with Queen Paola.

Pope Francis, during his homily on 8 December highlighted the primacy of grace. He said, "Were sin the only thing that mattered, we would be the most desperate of creatures, but the promised triumph of Christ's love enfolds everything in the Father's mercy...The Immaculate Virgin stands before us as a privileged witness of this promise and its fulfilment." Stressing the importance of the occasion he commented that the Holy Year is "itself a gift of grace." He further said, "To pass through the Holy Door means to rediscover the infinite mercy of the Father who welcomes everyone and goes out personally to encounter each of them."

Christ the Bearer of Good News Cathedral at Dispur, Guwahati, along with the cathedrals around the world opened the Holy door on 13 December. His Grace, Archbishop John Moolachira offered solemn prayers, opened the Holy Door and guided the entire faithful gathered to pass through the door.

The members of Hatigaon community along with the Priests, Religious and Faithful of the Archdiocese witnessed the ceremony and walked through the 'Holy Door' to obtain God's Mercy.

Followed by the solemn event was



the Eucharistic celebration officiated by Archbishop John, concelebrated by a number of Priests from various parishes of the Diocese.

Emphasising the importance of the year which offers an opportune time for all the faithful to receive graces from God, Archbishop John said, "At this juncture may I remind you that a mere walking through this 'Holy Door' will not grant one forgiveness or divine blessings! It has to be accompanied by an inner desire for conversion of one's heart and a thirst for God's intervention. Walking through this door is very symbolic. Just as the Israelites crossed through the red sea, leaving behind their memories of slavery and other pagan practices so too one who passes through this door should have a real desire for conversion of heart and to receive God's blessings in abundance." "Mercy is not an abstract term but one which expresses the face of God," he added.

Speaking about the existing situation around the world, he said, "Today's world more than ever stands in need of God's Mercy. We live in a world shattered by violence, corruption, crimes, theft, etc. People are up in arms waiting to create a world order through violent means." Saying that no arms can secure one's life and give peace and tranquillity, he stressed on the need to show mercy and compassion to the broken world in order to restore the harmony that existed at the time of creation. He called on the faithful to contribute to make this event an occasion for our brothers and sisters to experience God's mercy.

The Jubilee year which began on 8 December 2015 on the feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin will conclude on 20 November 2016 on the Feast of Christ the King.
