From the Superior General

Irresistible Call to Abound in Charity

The whole world is on its feet to fight the Pandemic that seems to threaten the very fabric of human existence. Its universal outbreak has sent out vibrations of fear and panic, leaving many people helpless, paralyzed and victimised. On the other hand, the same pandemic has brought out the best in humanity: many peoples and nations responded and are responding positively, doing all within their power to alleviate suffering, creating a network of solidarity and fraternity. We have seen how the leaders of nations, doctors, nurses, health workers, religious personnel and social workers have become beacons of light and hope to victims by their daring acts of love and goodness, kindness and generosity, faith and courage, and selfless and wholehearted services. The deadly virus has helped us discover our inner strength as well as our limitedness. Now more than ever, the pandemic situation has created a space to reflect upon our relationship with the planet with the most powerful possible message that nature can surprise us at any moment, with devastating consequences for every individual and society. It has made us comprehend how deeply connected we are to each other as fellow beings, how our joys and pains affect the other and how we are affected by the struggles and tears of the other. The experience of lock down is indeed a unique experience for every one of us and our responses to this experience vary from person to person. Certainly, the lockdown has resulted in cleaner air and clear

water across our most polluted cities, rivers and lakes.

Making a random evaluation of the experience of lock down in the congregation, I feel that it has brought us back on our knees, as the entire congregation was specially committed to the mission of prayer for the suffering world. Prayer assumed a personal meaning for most of us, as all of us spent hours before the Blessed Sacrament in silent love and adoration, interceding for the suffering world. The online retreat made us aware of the purpose of life, our role in creating a better world. The strength we received from our deep intimacy with the Lord in prayer urged us to respond to the pandemic by many concrete acts of love and charity. Sensing the need of the hour, the sisters and communities ventured out in genuine acts of Christian charity and works of mercy by offering the widow's mite to alleviate the sufferings of the poor and needy around them. It was so comforting to see how sisters volunteered to reach out to the needy with all what they could afford from their limited resources and mounting generosity and good will.

The present situation we are in is indeed a new opportunity to abound in charity, to live radically the commandment of love: to love the Lord with all our heart, with all our soul and with all our mind and love our neighbour as ourselves (Cf. Mt 22: 37-39). It calls for faith and courage to believe in the sun hidden beneath the dark clouds, similarly it calls for tremendous faith to believe in God when our incessant prayers do not seem to



pierce through the clouds of His apparent silence.

The crusade of charity we have witnessed all around and in the congregation in particular is a clear proof that we have been able to transcend our fears and doubts to a great extent and give wings to our deepest desire to love God and neighbour. This experience has made us experience the joy of giving and strengthened our conviction that 'there is more joy in giving than in receiving' (Acts 20: 35). As consecrated persons, it continues to challenge us to move out of our comfort zones: the security of our well-established institutions and well-set timetables, to share the plight of the poor, the unemployed, the homeless, the stranded labourers, the domestic workers, the daily labourers, those looking for safety and shelter and the hungry. It takes courage to be responsible promoters of life in the face of wide spread death, to care for the vulnerable in the community and in the society. This is possible only to those courageous women who can allow their hearts to burn with passion for God and passion for humanity. The pandemic will certainly submit to the power of the Lord and it should! He is alive, we believe in the power of the Risen Lord.

Mission Exposure Program



Mission exposure program for the aspiring missionaries had been one and important program in the schedule of Founder Bishop Ferrando when he was a novice master. This legacy of Founder has been effectively accomplished each year by the MSMHC in different provinces.

The MSMHC Hatigaon has been actively involved in the Exposure Program of the Archdiocese of Guwahati since it was introduced. This year too, the 63 Junior sisters along with Sr. Jiji Thomas, the Junior Mistress participated in the 12th annual mission exposure program organized by the Archdiocese of Guwahati under

the patronage of Archbishop John Moolachira from 13 to 19 January at Ambagaon Parish of Tezpur Diocese, Assam. Aimed at instilling a missionary thrust to young and budding missionaries in the formation, the week long program had 'Go into all the World and preach the Goodnews' as its theme. It had about 600 vibrant participants from various formation houses of the region.

With a grand inaugural function, this unique and joint missionary event kicked off, setting the right tone and motivating the participants for the missionary venture. The God encounter and rich experiences of the mission shared by the frontline

missionaries served as an oil to the lamp, letting the flame of the missionary spirit burning bright to the young participants as they moved from village to village, house to house, person to person sharing the Goodnews. Sr. Bridget Diengdoh, General Councilor for Evangelization emphasised on meeting people in their homes and living their daily life in the village in order to be effective in evangelization.

Being born into a missionary congregation, the Junior sisters set out with zeal for the mission and had indeed a thrilling and enriching missionary experiences. Sr. Ibasuklang Mary said that the program inspired her to search for new and creative ways to preach the Good news and Sr. Juliana Sephe added that she was enthused to venture out into the mission each day as she witnessed the desire of people to know more about Christ.

The programme gave them ample opportunities to have first-hand missionary experiences in the villages which in turn strengthened their missionary vocation and conviction.

Celebrating Republic Day

The workshop began with introductory sessions on self-awareness and preparation for integration. Each exercise aimed at healing and integration of various aspects of personal life. Sr. Maria Lalhriatpui exclaimed that the workshop led her to experience inner freedom to create a space for the divine spirit while Sr. K.C Catherine also said that she was able to encounter God within her and develop self-image.

Young Girls Trained for Job and Life Sustenance at CDI

Centre for Development Initiatives (CDI) conducted a training program for young girls aimed at building competence in Housekeeping cum Cooking that would fetch them sustainable jobs in the Domestic Workers' Sector. The ten days' program from 27 January to 5 February was successfully completed by about 21 young girls from different places. A group of well trained and expertise guided the trainees on various activities related to domestic works with practical proficiencies. Besides imparting the know-hows on various domestic

works, the trainees were given awareness on their rights, dignity of labour, financial management, basic ethical behaviours, personal safety

rules and hygiene, employability and entrepreneurship skills. The girls were given certificates at the completion of their training.



Spiritual Retreat for Children



To let the seeds of faith take deep root into the soul of little children, a three days spiritual retreat was organised by Missionary Animation

Centre (MAC) at Nongshyrngan Parish, Meghalaya from 29 to 31 January. A total of 250 children from Class - I to Class - VII from different

villages attended the retreat.

Sr. Bridget Diengdoh, General Councillor for Evangelization along with Sr. Celina Surin, MAC member and Sr. Bridgita War, Provincial Councillor for Evangelization guided the children into prayer. To draw them closer to God, they instilled in them the importance of God in their life, the power of the Word of God, love for the Church, the Holy Eucharist and Rosary.
