From the Superior General

To the Light through Love

One of the many letters Albert Einstein wrote to his son Lieserl has a golden content which reads: "There is an extremely powerful force that, so far, science has not found a formal explanation to. It is a force that includes and governs all others, and is even behind any phenomenon operating in the universe. This force explains everything and gives meaning to life. LOVE is the most powerful force there is, because it has no limits. If we want our species to survive, if we are to find meaning in life, if we want to save the world and every sentient being that inhabits it, love is the one and only answer."

The charism of our congregation consists of three essential components: *Mission ad gentes*, Catechesis, and Works of Charity. These three elements are summed up in a single phrase: *To the Light through Love* which is the MSMHC motto of the year taken from the letter of Founder Venerable Stephen Ferrando. It means, we reach out to people and bring them to Christ by our love.

In his annual report submitted to the Congregation for the Propagation of Faith in 1952, Bishop Ferrando stated that the Church will reach out to all categories of people through love. It was a period of post independent and post Second World War. The Tribals in Northeast India, who for years settled on the mountain ranges and frontiers were just catching up with the rest of Indians in education and progress through the tireless efforts of the missionaries. Our Founder too worked tirelessly for the people,

with all respect and love for the culture of the people of Northeast India. He wrote: "From our part, we distanced ourselves from any shadow of politics, but always inspired by the love of Christ, we befriend the tribes, in order to give them the most important thing: "Life of the soul." The missionaries opened the arena of growth and progress, established schools and vocational training centres, set up dispensaries and health centres.

New epoch has got new challenges. From the point of education and global connectivity, Northeast India has made a great leap and Catholic population too has grown. But in many parts of India, Christians undergo struggles and endure various kinds of persecution. We have come to a period where we encounter restrictions and oppositions from fanatics. Among the developed nations like Europe too, there is serious crises of faith due to secularisation of religion. Digital media exposes people to the risk of addiction, isolation, gradual loss of contact with concrete reality and the divine. There is a gradual replacement of religious values with the worldly pleasures and allurements, and the consequent scourge of abortion, the spread of HIV, and the plight of street children without home and economic resources.

As daughters of a great missionary bishop, the MSMHC cannot stop proclaiming Christ, nor can remain frozen before the tragedies of the people, especially, in places where people are less than enthusiastic about spiritual life and Gospel values. The basic question



before the MSMHC is 'Creative Fidelity'. That is, how we can creatively live our founding charism in the present context. As Pope Francis rightly stated "Change of times" requires a "change of pastoral mindset." This calls us to lean toward, listen to, and perceive the new thing towards which God draws all of creation. Our prayer in response to the needs of the world right now is to seek peace and harmony in the hearts of all and nations, to heal and restore love to the broken world and that God may be at the centre of life and the universe.

In this perspective, the MSMHC march forward with our charism of proclaiming, teaching and performing works of charity all under the powerful force of LOVE. Care of HIV patients, differently abled children, the migrants and refugees, the domestic workers and victims of human trafficking, educating the dropouts and young girls from rural areas are some of the commendable initiatives that are taking shape in our congregation. We do not remain in complacency. As Einstein stated, we need to invent a bomb of love which alone can destroy the hate, selfishness and greed that can devastate humanity.

At some point of time in one's life a chaotic thought of 'to be or not to be' might be the question streaming through the mind when faced with existential dilemma.

Just as a mariner stuck in deep ocean with 'Water, water, everywhere, nor any drop to drink' (Coleridge), some might have experienced people everywhere with no one to help; the pang of loneliness amidst the crowd; poverty amongst the affluent society; hunger amidst tons of food; not a slab to lay head beneath skyscrapers; sadness amidst burst of laughter and then wonder 'Why'. When the heat of troubles soars, pains and sufferings deeply engulf with no one to heed, one's best choice is to gaze at the vast empty space praying for the healing power to descent - 'Oh! lift me as a wave, a leaf, a cloud! Our world is a common home where everyone born into it is given a space by God the Creator. No one, no nation is a complete self but a part of the cosmos. Looking at the dwindling trend today - once friendly nations are torn apart by war; friends become foes: children abandon parents vice versa; homeless in the streets cry for food; the wounded and the dying gasp for help and no one seems to really care just like Cain's cold reply to God when asked about his brother Abel, 'Am I my brother's keeper?' The only prescription to disconnectedness and indifference to one another is to live Jesus' teaching to 'love your neighbour as you love yourself'. (Mt 22:39) Looking through the eyes of God will help restore the divine nature of human heart to love, to care and to feel for one another without prejudice. Jesus was able to deeply feel the joy, the pain and sufferings of others as His own -'Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers you do unto me'. (Mt 25:31-46) Jesus' teachings are a stark revelation of an ideal attitude of co-responsibility, co-existence and connectedness and a call to selfless love.

MSMHC Arrives in Papua New Guinea



April 23, 2022 spun a remarkable historic moment in the annals of the MSMHC as Sr. Mini Joseph and Sr. Lapynshai Khongwir reached Papua New Guinea at 6:30am (PNG time) as the pioneering missionaries. They were received at the Port Moresby International Airport by Fr. Srimal Silva, SDB, Provincial Economer of

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Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands and were warmly welcomed by the Salesian Provincialate community.

The sisters were given a temporary shelter at Emmous Conference Centre, Taurama Road, East Boroko NCD (National Capital District) which is a centre for corporate event, workshop, seminar,

private and group retreat.

The sisters will be working in Don Bosco Technical School, Gabutu which is close to the Pacific Ocean and a ten minutes' drive from Emmaus Centre. The centre comes under the Parish of Mary Help of Christians, Sabama, Port Moresby. The sisters will be engaged in pastoral works mainly family visits, catechetical instructions and systematic follow up of different age groups in their faith journey, care for women association and part time teaching at Don Bosco Technical College and school.



WAC Lenten Programs, Hawaii



In a move to deepen God experiences during Lenten season, members of Women Apostles for Catechesis (WAC), Hawaii Unit undertook a spiritual journey since March 2, Ash Wednesday through the observance of various spiritual exercises such as prayers, popular devotions and reception of

Sr. Saroj Kindo, the main in charge of the centre said that it was in response to the present need of the people aimed at the integral growth of children and is hopeful of its future.

FRCSS New Wing Inaugurated, Lesotho

On January 31, a new wing for Early Identification and Intervention Unit at Ferrando Resource Centre Special School, Lesotho was inaugurated and blessed by Bishop Augustinus T Bane OMI, the Bishop of Leribe.
