The MSMHC Provincial Chapters scripted a remarkable and historic event with its significant theme: *Creative Fidelity to the Founding Charism and Spirit: Challenges and Responses*. The Chapters were held in all the six Provinces at different point of time spanning from the month of May to July.

Underling the significance and relevance of the theme in her orientation talk titled - '*Creative Fidelity to the Founding Charism and Spirit: Understanding through the Prism of Three Lives*', Sr. Philomena Mathew, the Superior General emphasized that creative fidelity to charism "aims to connect together our roots and our wings, that is to say to conjoin

tradition and creativity harmoniously." She called for a forward march with a blend of tradition and innovation in living and responding to the emerging situations with creative fidelity to the founding charism of the congregation.

A week-long spiritual retreat guided by Fr. Devasia Vazhayil SDB preceded the Chapters. With a time of collective study, discernment and varied spiritual experiences, Chapter was a fulfilling pilgrimage wherein 'My Story becomes Our Story'. The confluence of the members trod the path of a synodal journey of discernment, communion, participation and mission.

From the Superior General

Hasten to Serve with Love

The significant event of World Youth Day was held in the capital city of Lisbon, Portugal, from August 1- 6, 2023 with the theme - “Mary arose and went with haste” (Lk 1:39). The biblical episode of the Visitation presents Mary as both a woman of charity and missionary. Leaving in haste signifies the attitude of Pope Francis depicted in World Youth Day 2023: “May young people’s evangelization be active and missionary, for this is how they will recognize and witness the presence of the living Christ.”

“Mary went in haste” has also inspired the apostolic life of the MSMHC. Article 2 of the first constitutions thus stated: “The Blessed Virgin ‘went with haste into the hill-country’ to perform a work of charity and carry the treasure of the divine grace to Elizabeth and John. The sisters will imitate the readiness and charity of Our Lady, to be worthy of the missionary vocation.”

Every little act of charity done out of pure love for God and neighbour is a treasure more precious than gold in the sight of God. Jesus affirms this truth when He exalted the poor widow who put in two small copper coins into the treasury (cf. Lk 21:3). The works of charity as the key to paradise has been lucidly depicted in the parable of ‘the Last Judgement’. So insignificant was their actions that those on the

right side of the King were not even aware that they had extended their helping hand to the King. Through this parable, Jesus teaches us that He takes note of every small act of charity done to the poor and vulnerable, especially those at the margins.

At the end of all, what counts is love. Loving kindness, be it in word, deed or gaze generates life. It leaves a permanent mark in the memory of the recipient. Addressing representatives of some aid and charitable centres in Lisbon, Pope Francis urged them to continue making “life a gift of love and joy.” He also said that there is no such thing as “abstract love”. Concrete love that let one’s own hands dirty by touching the reality and the misery of others generates life, and is an inspiration to others. Love makes us happy not only in heaven, but here on earth too, because it expands our hearts and allows us to embrace the meaning of life. Pope Francis emphasized: “If we want to be truly happy, then, let us learn to transform everything into love, offering to others our work and our time, speaking kindly words and doing good deeds with a smile, an embrace, by listening, or even with a look.” He encouraged the young people and those gathered before him to live in this way.

If we do not waste time complaining, but instead focus



on meeting people’s concrete needs with joy and trust in God’s providence, then wonderful things can happen in life. While we are fragile and in need, the Gospel’s compassionate outlook leads us to see the needs of the most vulnerable. It likewise impels us to serve the poor – the excluded, the outcast, the discarded, the little ones, the defenceless – those most beloved of God at the peripheries. They are the Church’s real treasure. Jesus identifies himself with the poor. The best and only way to love and serve Him is to love and serve the most vulnerable in our community and in the society.

Mary went in haste to help because she observed and listened from the heart and was propelled by love. Selfless service with compassionate outlook is possible if we can only identify ourselves with our suffering brethren.


